SHERIFF'S MESSAGE



These honorees were acknowledged for their exceptional contributions to the Agency, outstanding fieldwork, and displays of bravery. Sheriff Cox presided over the event as the Master of Ceremonies, while the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard members presented the Colors. Joy Mitchell graced the occasion with a rendition of the National Anthem, followed by Chaplain Dave Mohler's invocation and Father Karl Chimiak's benediction. Again, a heartfelt congratulations to all the deserving award recipients.

Patrol Bureau Notable Cases

The Patrol Bureau responded to numerous serious incidents during the 1st quarter below are examples of a few.

Deputies Apprehend Regional Theft Suspects

On March 17, 2024, at 6:49 p.m., Deputy Campbell responded to the Fox Run Shopping Center for a theft that had occurred at the Bath and Body Works store in Prince Frederick. Employees of

the store advised that a black male and black female wearing masks had entered the store, shoved several items from the store shelves in a purse and a store basket, and ran out of the business. Due to the quick actions of some of the employees, they were able to take cellphone photos of the suspects and the vehicle they fled in. This info was quickly relayed to deputies. Deputy Hendrickson observed the suspect vehicle by the Fox Run Starbucks. Upon making contact with the driver of the suspect vehicle, Natara De'Asia Ortiz, 22 of Hanover, Deputy Hendrickson observed multiple Bath and Body Works items in plain view. Ortiz was asked to exit the vehicle to which she failed to comply. While attempting to detain Ortiz, she was actively resisting arrest. While taking Ortiz into custody, the male suspect, Curtis Gibril Tucker Jr., 22 of Hyattsville, was observed exiting the Starbucks. Tucker admitted to being involved with the theft from Bath and Body Works and was placed into custody without incident.

A search of the vehicle was conducted, and numerous Bath and Body Works hand baskets filled with various lotions, shampoo, candles, and other brand-new items were located. Along with all the Bath and Body Works products, numerous brand-new pieces of clothing, pet products, and miscellaneous household items all with price tags or stickers still on them were located in the vehicle. During this investigation, it was discovered that Ortiz and Tucker had just traveled from St. Mary's County after committing the same type of theft at the Bath and Body Works located in the First Colony Shopping Center in California, MD. It was also discovered that they were both potential suspects of numerous thefts in Anne Arundel County. Further investigation revealed the total value of items stolen from the Prince Frederick Bath and Body Works store was \$626.45. The approximate value of the items stolen from the St. Mary's location was just under \$700. The estimated value of clothing and additional miscellaneous items found has not yet been determined.

Both subjects were placed under arrest and transported to the Calvert County Detention Center and charged with Theft: \$100 to Under \$1,500. Ortiz was also charged with Resist/Interfere with Arrest.

Deputies Apprehend Prince Frederick Murder Suspect

On February 15, 2024, at approximately 10:22 p.m., deputies from the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Patrol Bureau responded to the area of Armory Road and Fairgrounds Road in Prince Frederick, for the report of a serious assault. Deputies arrived on the scene and located one adult male suffering from critical injuries. Emergency Medical Services responded to the scene and rendered aid to the victim. The victim identified as Shaquille Quadry Braxton, 30 of Prince Frederick, was transported to Calvert Health where he succumbed to his injuries and was later pronounced deceased. Detectives from the Criminal Investigations Bureau responded and assumed the investigation. Through the investigation, detectives located the suspect, Thomas Eugene Harris II, 27 of Prince Frederick, who was taken into custody. Harris was transported to

the Calvert County Detention Center and has been charged with First-Degree Murder and First-Degree Assault. Additional charges will be forthcoming. This appears to be an isolated incident.

Deputies Apprehend Theft Suspects Following Chase, Bailout

On January 6, 2024, at 9:39 p.m., deputies from the Calvert County Sheriff's Office received a report of a stolen vehicle traveling southbound on Rt. 4 in the area of Chaney Road in Dunkirk. Sgt. Robshaw spotted the vehicle near Lyons Creek Road, where it promptly turned off all its lights in an attempt to evade detection. Sgt. Robshaw activated his emergency lights and sirens to initiate a traffic stop in the area of Brickhouse Road. The suspect vehicle continued southbound at speeds of 110 mph in a posted 55 mph zone. Deputies observed the suspect vehicle continuously turning their headlights on and off, swerving between lanes, and cutting off other motorists. The pursuit continued to Rt. 4 and Lower Marlboro Road in Owings. There, the suspect vehicle made an abrupt right turn on Lower Marlboro Road, slid out of control, and came to a rest in the yard of a residence in the 1300 block of Lower Marlboro Road. Three black males wearing all black were observed bailing out of the vehicle into fleeing into the woods. DFC Idol and his K-9 partner Stryker along with Deputy Newton responded to the scene, conducting a successful track that led to the apprehension of two suspects in the 1500 block of Hinton Drive. Cpl. Bortchevsky, operating a drone, located the third suspect nearby. Two juvenile suspects were transported to the Calvert County Sheriff's Office and charged on a youth report for eluding an officer on foot. Jalen Lewis Webb, 19, of Landover, was transported to the Calvert County Detention Center where he was charged with Theft of a Motor Vehicle and various traffic-related offenses.

CIVILIAN OF THE QUARTER

Office Specialist II, Sarah Cox plays an important role in the day-to-day support functions of the Sheriff's Office. Sarah was hired in 2020 as an Office Assistant II and quickly transitioned to an Office Assistant III, and now holds the position of Office Specialist II. Sarah provides support for criminal investigations as well as patrol.

In 2021, the Sheriff's Office was made aware that all Maryland agencies would eventually have to transition from reporting UCR crime data to reporting NIBRS crime data. Sarah has attended training which would help prepare our agency for the transition. Over the past few months, the agency had to enter six months of data with a 3% error rate or lower to be

certified. Sarah has worked through her lunch hour, stayed beyond her regular hours, and even worked on the weekends from time to time to make sure our agency would meet the criteria for certification. She has participated in many discussions through virtual meetings and emails and created training materials for the upcoming transition. Since this process started, Sarah has been 100% committed to making it successful all while keeping up with her workload and maintaining a positive attitude. On March 8, 2023, the Calvert County Sheriff's Office was officially certified to report NIBRS data.

For these reasons, Sarah Cox is selected as the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Civilian of the Quarter.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS BUREAU

In the first quarter of 2024, the Special Operations Bureau executed 12 residential search warrants, 2 arrest warrants, and 6 integrated drug enforcement operations on behalf of the Criminal Investigations Bureau. The Special Operations Bureau assisted the Patrol Bureau during the January 9th storm surge. Additionally, members of the Special Operation Team (SOT) continued to provide contracted security services for the BHE GT&S Cove Point LNG facility.

This quarter several training opportunities were completed for deputies, county and business partners, and community members. SOT Personnel attended the regional Maritime Operations Group Meeting and assisted with the SMCJA Violet Critical Incident Response instruction block. SOT personnel continued to conduct Violent Critical Incident Response training at several locations throughout the county including county organizations, businesses, churches, and daycares.

SOT personnel attended the NTOA Search Warrant class and updated the agency Search Warrant Theory Class. Furthermore, SOT personnel put on 11 criminal justice presentations, and multiple Bearcat displays including an escort of the Easter Bunny for the Hallowing Point Park event and assisted with Calvert County Sheriff's Office new hire applicant testing.



Various members completed NTOA Search Warrant training, Force Science Training, Direct Action Resource Center Law Enforcement County Terrorism Level 2 course, Training for Trainers and certified 4 SOT members as firearms instructors. SOT personnel administered lateral hire tactics and Taser training and prepared for and scheduled LEOSA range dates. In preparation for yearly firearms qualifications, SOT personnel made range improvements to increase the tactical proficiencies of all sworn personnel. The explosives detection K-9 and his handler assigned to SOT completed explosive scans at the courthouses and assisted as needed for various other operations.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS BUREAU

Detectives Continue to Investigate Calvert Cold Case

On August 19, 2006, at approximately 2:04 a.m., Calvert County Sheriff's Deputies responded to the area of Dares Beach Road and Armory Road in Prince Frederick, for the report of an accident involving a pedestrian. The victim, later identified as Vincent Depaul "Johnny" Medley (DOB: 03-06-1964), of Mechanicsville, was pronounced deceased on the scene.

Medley was last seen leaving the area of Central Drive and Dares Beach Road on foot wearing a dark-colored t-shirt, blue jeans, a blue ball cap, and white tennis shoes. Medley was struck in the roadway and the operator of the vehicle fled the scene in a dark-colored SUV of an unknown make and model, westbound on Dares Beach Road towards Route 4.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT UNIT (DEU) NOTABLE CASE

The Calvert County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) Criminal Investigations Bureau (CIB) Drug Enforcement Unit (DEU) has arrested a Prince Frederick man upon execution of a search warrant resulting in several CDS and Firearm charges.

In January 2024, detectives began an investigation involving the distribution of Controlled Dangerous Substances in the 100 block of Alton Court in Prince Frederick. Throughout the investigation, Andre Tajjon Grice, 27 of Prince Frederick, was observed conducting multiple hand-to-hand drug transactions. Search and seizure warrants were obtained for Grice's residence, vehicle, and person.

On February 7, 2024, the CCSO DEU, along with members of the CCSO Special Operations Team (SOT), observed Grice operating a vehicle in the area of Armory Road and Dares Beach Road in Prince Frederick. Grice was taken into custody without incident. Grice was then advised of the pending search and seizure warrant for his residence and informed detectives the only person in the apartment was a four-year-old child left unattended.

Team members continued with the search warrant inside the residence and located a juvenile alone in a bedroom. Child Protective Services (CPS) was contacted and responded to the home.

A search of the residence was conducted, and the following evidence was recovered:

- Approximately 14.7 grams of suspected cocaine
- 6 suspected fentanyl pills
- Approximately 50.3 grams of suspected cannabis
- Approximately 51 grams of suspected promethazine
- Approximately 673.9 grams of suspected psilocybin
- \$4,332.00 in U.S. currency
- A Trailsman 68 .22caliber revolver
- A Glock 43 9mm handgun
- A Taurus 9mm handgun
- An AMI Jager AR-15 .22 caliber rifle
- Numerous 9mm magazines
- Numerous rounds of .22 caliber and 9mm ammunition
- One Apple iPhone



A computer check revealed Grice is prohibited from possessing firearms/ammunition due to a previous firearm offense. Grice was placed under arrest and transported to the Calvert County Detention Center where he was charged with multiple CDS and Firearms charges in addition to Child Neglect. The investigation is ongoing.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT UNIT (DEU) NOTABLE CASE

In the winter of 2024, the Calvert County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) Drug Enforcement Unit (DEU) began conducting a narcotics investigation on a subject distributing cocaine in the Prince Frederick, Maryland area. A search and seizure warrant was obtained for the residence and on February 13, 2024, the CCSO DEU, along with members of the CCSO Special Operations Team, set up to execute the aforementioned

search and seizure warrant. A female later identified as Sharaze Tyuiana Gross, 34 of Huntingtown, was located and detained inside the residence. A search of the residence revealed the following:



- One metal press used to compress powder narcotics into $\frac{1}{4}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ kilogram quantities of narcotics
- Four digital scales with narcotics residue
- Sandwich baggies for packaging narcotics
- Two Pyrex measure cups and one colander for cooking/manufacturing suspected crack cocaine
- One box of vinyl gloves
- Four cellular telephones
- One roll of heat seal bags
- A spray can of glass cleaner with a false compartment
- Approximately 30 grams of suspected cocaine
- Approximately 2.1 grams of suspected crack cocaine
- \$4,270.00 of U.S. currency
- A silver 2000 Cadillac sedan

For all these reasons, Detective B. Anderson has been named the 2024 Detective of the 1st Quarter for the CCSO Criminal Investigations Bureau.

TWIN BEACHES PATROL

The Twin Beach Patrol was commanded by Lt. Thomas Tilley with the assistance of Sgt. Ryan Kampf, Cpl. N. Gilmore and eight deputies during this quarter. Twin Beach deputies responded to 485 calls for service along with 1588 self-initiated calls for both the North Beach and Chesapeake Beach areas.

These calls consisted of traffic stops, patrol checks, follow-ups, etc.

The Twin Beach Patrol continues to provide traffic control for Beach Elementary each day during the morning and afternoon hours while the new school construction continues to be completed.



- The traffic control has helped the traffic flow in both the morning and afternoon commuters within Chesapeake Beach. This also ensures the safety of the students, parents, teachers, and bus drivers arriving and leaving the school's area.

There are two monthly reports completed and shared during the North Beach and Chesapeake Beach Townhall meetings.

- Deputies attend these meetings to ensure the safety of citizens that attend along with answering questions and concerns by both the elected officials and citizens for the Twin Beaches.

Deputies are encouraged to conduct foot patrols in areas like shopping centers, boardwalks, nature trails, and businesses.

- The foot patrols have shown positive law enforcement presence and interactions in the areas traveled every day by citizens within the Twin Beaches.

Deputies conduct patrol checks 24 hours 7 days a week to deter crimes from occurring.

- These consistent patrol checks have reinforced to the community that deputies are consistently traveling through areas for the citizen's safety.

Twin Beaches deputies will increase community outreach through tactical community policing, special events, and mountain bike patrols with face-to-face interactions.

- These face-to-face interactions have been very welcomed by the community within the Twin Beaches. Deputies have begun the type of interaction with the community to allow them to form trust with deputies that is needed to improve the everyday experience living within the Twin Beaches. This includes many deputies being known by their names which brings a personable relationship this law enforcement.
