SHERIFF'S MESSAGE

The second quarter of 2024 has come and gone. In this quarter I had the distinct pleasure of participating in and observing the graduation ceremonies of our Calvert County high school graduates. It is exciting to see them start new adventures in life. I wish them good luck and prosperity wherever it is life takes them.

The second quarter is also when the budget is closed out for the current fiscal year and the new budget is finalized for the upcoming year. This was another fiscally challenging year for Calvert County, which ultimately translated into budget cuts for the Sheriff's Office. Even with these budget cuts, I can assure you that your Sheriff's Office is committed to maintaining the same level of operations the citizens of Calvert County deserve.

One of the highlights of this quarter was watching the justice system at work in Calvert County. After many months, Mr. Brandon Turner of Greenbelt was found guilty of Attempted Murder of Master Deputy Flynt. While we still await sentencing, this is a major step in getting some closure from this horrific event. Thank you again to everyone involved in this endeavor.

Letter to the Community

I just wanted to take a moment and thank everyone involved in the prosecution of the evil perpetrator who decided to come to Calvert County and shoot at your deputies. On December 17th, 2022, at around 9:30 P.M., Mr. Brandon Turner of Greenbelt was stopped for a traffic violation. Instead of completing the traffic stop, he decided to flee and involve our deputies in a vehicle pursuit. While fleeing down the highway, he began to shoot recklessly and indiscriminately at deputies, putting their lives and the lives of citizens in danger.

Our deputies did not waiver, instead, they continued the pursuit and eventually disabled the suspect's vehicle. The suspect still refused to surrender and exited his vehicle firing several shots, critically striking Master Deputy Flynt. Master Deputy Flynt was able to administer a tourniquet to himself before losing consciousness. Other deputies dragged him behind cover and they, along with responding Calvert County EMS personnel, performed additional lifesaving measures. Our deputies continued to return fire, striking the suspect who cowardly ran into the nearby woods of a residential neighborhood. He was eventually captured, rendered emergency aid, and taken into custody.

Deputy Flynt was quickly transported to CalvertHealth Medical Center. I personally watched those heroes in the emergency room go to work on him. Responding deputies, EMS personnel, and hospital staff undoubtedly saved his life that night, but Master Deputy Flynt was not totally out of the woods. Once stabilized he was flown to MedStar Washington Hospital Center. He faced several surgeries and didn't

know for a few days if they could save his leg. Our deputies and correctional deputies stayed with him 24/7 as he was recovering. Once he recovered enough to be released, we brought him home. In true Calvert County fashion, the citizens welcomed him home with a roadside reception that spanned miles. Due to the severity of his injuries, we didn't know if Master Deputy Flynt would ever make it back to full duty. However, after several surgeries, lots of painful rehabilitation, and an exercise of true determination, I am proud to say he is back to full duty; working and doing the job he loves.

The support he received from the citizens of Calvert County was amazing. It was so amazing our States Attorney, Bob Harvey, was concerned it could affect the trial and asked us to do our best to quiet the wave of support from inside and outside of the office. This is one of the hardest things I have had to do as the Sheriff. Having been a combat veteran, I can tell you without a doubt, the things I saw on the body cameras amazed me. Not that I expected any different, but you never know how people will react in the line of fire. Our deputies executed flawlessly and without hesitation. They worked to eliminate the threat to our citizens without concern for themselves. I could not be more proud of the men and women of this department.

The trial finally started last week for Mr. Turner. I watched every day of the trial and can tell you State's Attorney Bob Harvey and his staff are amazing. He put on a trial that did not allow any of the blame to be shifted from anywhere but where it belonged, Mr. Turner. He was found guilty by a jury for attempted first-degree murder, multiple counts of first-degree assault, and several other charges. I would like to thank the jury for their time and dedication in rendering a just verdict. The sentencing will take place in October.

I say all this to tell you what I already knew. We have the absolute best deputies, emergency medical staff, volunteers, States Attorney's Office, and civilian staff in the world. But, what makes the job worthwhile is the support that is shown on a regular basis from the Citizens of Calvert County. Your support allows us to do our job and do our job the way it should be done. We will continue to send the message that if you commit crimes in Calvert County, we will do everything in our power to hold you accountable. Please continue to pray for all of our first responders and may the Lord continue to bless Calvert County!

PATROL BUREAU

The Patrol Bureau is comprised of three Patrol Districts, the Twin Beaches Detachment, the Support Services Unit, Fleet Services, the Automated Enforcement Program, the K-9 program, and Civilian Staff.

The Bureau is commanded by Captain Brian Bowen, Lieutenant Eric Basham (District 1), Lieutenant Jason Dean (District 2), Lieutenant Thomas Tilly (District 3), and Lieutenant Joe Hollinger (Twin Beaches) with the assistance of Patrol Shift Commanders F/SGT. Naecker, F/SGT. Morder, F/SGT. G. Shrawder, F/Sgt. E. Carter, F/Sgt. M. McCarroll and Support Services Commander F/SGT. Phelps.



DFC. Sean Hendrickson was awarded the 'Deputy of the Quarter' for his efforts during the 2nd quarter. DFC. Hendrickson conducted 70 Traffic Stops resulting in 1 DUI arrest and 138 combined citations and warnings. He also had 8 on-view arrests, 72 patrol checks, and 40 K9 scans. DFC Hendrickson's contributions extend beyond the impressive numbers. His proactive approach to traffic enforcement has significantly enhanced road safety in our community. By conducting a high number of traffic stops and issuing numerous citations and warnings, he has played a crucial role in deterring dangerous driving behaviors and reducing traffic-related incidents. Handling 458 calls for service in just three months showcases DFC Hendrickson's

exceptional ability to manage a high volume of work efficiently and effectively. His prompt response to these calls ensures that community members receive timely assistance and that incidents are addressed swiftly. In addition, the 40 K9 scans conducted by DFC Hendrickson and his K9 partner have been instrumental in detecting illegal substances and preventing their distribution. This proactive measure curbs drug-related activities and serves as a deterrent to potential offenders. DFC Hendrickson's performance from April to June exemplifies the qualities of an outstanding law enforcement officer. His exceptional performance during the past quarter reflects his professionalism, skill, and dedication to duty. We are proud to have him a part of our team and are confident that he will continue to serve with distinction. His commitment, proactive approach, and exemplary execution of duties have earned him the well-deserved title of 'Deputy of the 2nd Quarter'.

Patrol Highlights

On April 26, 2024, Sheriff Ricky Cox and the Calvert County Sheriff's Office welcomed six new deputies following the final inspection and graduation exercises from the Southern Maryland Criminal Justice Academy (SMCJA) Police Entrance Level Training Program Session 53 at Calvert High School in Prince Frederick. The deputies were among a total of 20 candidates- 6 from Charles County and 8 from St. Mary's County.

Class Coordinator DFC Benjamin Luffey with the St. Mary's County Sheriff's Office kicked off the ceremony by announcing the entry of the graduating class. SMJCA Director Bobby Jones of Calvert County, welcomed graduates, their families, and respective guests.

Members from all three counties' Honor Guard teams presented the colors as Ms. Danielle Baker of Chopticon HS performed the National Anthem. Chaplain Larry Crabtree of the St. Mary's County Sheriff's Office offered the invocation and benediction.

Abby has great communication skills, both written and verbal, when dealing with members of our agency, outside agencies, and the public. Abby has a great work ethic and continues to be a great asset to the Sheriff's Office.

CORRECTIONAL DEPUTY OF THE QUARTER



DFC Anthony Marinelli

Deputy First Class Anthony Marinelli is currently assigned as a Booking Administrative Deputy working the 2300-0700 shift. DFC Marinelli has been tasked with many new duties not directly associated with his assignment. DFC Marinelli conducts regular inventories of stored inmate property, scans all files completed by other deputies for errors, corrects any found errors, and voluntarily assists records in the absence of the records clerks. When assisting records, he updates all tracking sheets with new inmate case data, completes inmate files, calculates diminutions, and creates release packets for inmates committed to the Maryland prison system. He is currently the only First Class Deputy who can accurately complete these tasks. DFC Marinelli is a valued asset to the agency whose work often goes unnoticed, even though his outstanding work is vital to the success of the agency. DFC Marinelli regularly goes out of his way to assist the agency when other squads are short-staffed. This along with his perfect attendance makes him an extremely reliable Deputy. DFC Marinelli completed the most incident reports of all deputies and completed the third-highest amount of self-initiated reports for all of 2023. DFC Marinelli's outstanding performance is greatly appreciated, and we are proud to commend him as the Detention Center's 2024 'Deputy of the Second Quarter'.





The Calvert County Corrections Bureau hosted an Emergency Response Team Basic Operator School from April 29th through May 3rd, at the Southern Maryland Criminal Justice Academy and the Charles County Detention Center. The course is a 40-hour program involving extensive physical evolutions and practical blocks of instruction on topics including ERT responsibilities, defensive tactics, and decision-making.

18 recruits from three different agencies applied to attend the program. 14 recruits passed the selection process from a combination of the Calvert County Corrections Bureau, Charles County Detention Center, and the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services. Out of the 14 recruits, 7 of the recruits successfully completed the program.

Correctional Deputy First Class Michael Lanier #126 from the Calvert County Corrections Bureau was amongst those to successfully complete the program.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS BUREAU



In the second quarter of 2024, the Special Operations and Homeland Security Bureau executed 7 residential search and seizure warrants on behalf of the Criminal Investigations Bureau, resolved 2 criminal barricades, and conducted grid searches for fleeing suspects related to a multi-vehicle pursuit and bailout. Additionally, members of the Special Operation Team (SOT) continued to provide contracted security services for the BHE GT&S Cove Point LNG facility.


During this period, several training opportunities were completed for deputies, county business partners, and community members. SOT personnel continued to conduct Violent Critical Incident Response training at several locations throughout the county including county organizations, businesses, churches, and daycares. SOT Personnel organized and instructed a regional CIT class and developed new Calvert Crisis Response plans for several locations. Personnel also coordinated a new grant-funded Managing the Crisis training for CCSO and regional partners. In addition, personnel organized a presentation for the leadership of Southern Maryland and completed multiple Bearcat displays at schools, daycares, and early learning centers.

This quarter, SOT personnel aided with the all-inclusive games sponsored by the Special Olympics at Calvert High School, assisting with set up, interacting with the athletes, and presenting metals. SOT personnel assisted with Calvert County Sheriff's Office new hire



applicant testing and administered the State's yearly physical fitness test for Sheriff's Office personnel. SOT Personnel conducted LEOSA range qualifications for retired officers and yearly firearms training for all sworn Sheriff's Office personnel. SOT personnel assisted with the security of the Key Bridge and attended MTOG meetings and Emergency Vehicle Operations Training.

In their pursuit to stay up to date on the latest and best tactical applications and training methodologies, members trained with regional partners, to include several training evolutions at Prince George's County's Firearms and Tactical Training Complex. Personnel continued the pursuit of increased partnerships with local and regional allied agencies, hosting a regional SWAT meeting, bringing decision-makers together, and discussing current trends and obstacles facing the community. Additionally, members in coordination with the Prince George's County Office of the Sheriff's Tactical Team are planning for a fall SWAT School to be hosted in Prince George's County.



Various SOT members completed NTOA Hostage Rescue class, Direct Action Resource Center Counter Terrorism Training, NTOA webinars, and attended de-escalation and legal use of force training. SOT Personnel conducted Search Warrant Theory training for several bureaus within the agency and sponsored members of the agency to attend the Anne Arundel County Swat School. The SOT explosives detection K-9 and his handler assigned to SOT completed explosive scans at the courthouses and assisted as needed for various other operations including integrations with the ATF.

Lastly, SOT member Cpl. DeFelice was awarded the American Legion Law Officer of the Year for the region.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIVE BUREAU NOTABLE CASE

FALSE REPORT OF ARMED ROBBERY IN DUNKIRK

On June 4, 2024, around 10:30 a.m., the Calvert County Sheriff's Office received a report of an alleged armed robbery at the Safeway Gas Pumps located at 10276 Southern MD Blvd in Dunkirk. The report was filed by Brian Arnell Hall, 35 of Washington D.C., who claimed that an unknown suspect had approached him with a weapon and demanded his wallet.

Following a thorough investigation, the Calvert County Sheriff's Office has determined that the report was false. Evidence gathered from surveillance footage, witness interviews, and other investigative methods revealed inconsistencies in Mr. Hall's account of the events. The investigation concluded that no armed robbery took place and Hall fabricated the incident. Hall is facing charges of False Statement to a Law Enforcement Officer.

Sheriff Ricky Cox stated, "We take all reports of criminal activity very seriously and allocate significant resources to ensure the safety of our community. False reports not only waste valuable police resources but also create unnecessary fear and anxiety among residents. We are committed to holding individuals accountable for providing false information to law enforcement."

The Calvert County Sheriff's Office urges the public to report suspicious activities or crimes accurately and responsibly. False reporting is a criminal offense and will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

During the Second Quarter of 2024, the Office of Professional Standards received the following:

Received Public Service Reports and Internal Complaints were investigated and/or are currently under investigation. Applicable Public Service case investigations that were concluded, were forwarded to the Administrative Charging Committee for review.

All Use of Force and Vehicle Pursuit Reports were reviewed and forwarded to the IAPRO Database.

During the quarter, OPS staff attended Police Accountability meetings, ACC Training, conducted mandated sex offender verifications, gathered proofs for assigned CALEA standards, completed PIA requests, and administered the agency's Random Drug Testing program.

TWIN BEACHES PATROL


The Twin Beach Patrol is commanded by Lt. Joe Hollinger with the assistance of Sgt. D. Naughton and Cpl. Gilmore along with eight deputies.

- Beach deputies responded to 280 citizen calls for service and 342 self-initiated calls for the North Beach and Chesapeake Beach areas. Self-initiated calls include traffic stops, patrol checks, business checks, and follow-ups.


- In addition to working hard in the beach the Twin Beach Deputies enjoy interacting with the community and having fun. On April 16, 2024, Deputy First Class Savick concluded a traffic stop to find a small dog running on the roadway toward his patrol cruiser. The pup jumped into DFC Savick's patrol vehicle and was treated to a short ride along until his humans were located. The pup was released on good behavior to his owners.



- The Twin Beach deputies provide traffic control daily at Beach Elementary when school is in session, conduct patrol checks of businesses and neighborhoods, and perform foot patrols on the boardwalks and nature trails.
- Monthly reports are generated for the Chesapeake Beach and North Beach monthly Town Hall meetings. After the presentation of these reports questions or concerns may be addressed between the towns/residents and the Beach Deputies.
- The Twin Beach Deputies assisted in several special events held within the towns this quarter. These events include the End Hunger Dragon Boat Festival, First Friday events and Farmers Markets in North Beach, and the Shatter the Stigma 5k, Summer Nights Festivals, and the Stars and Stripes celebration in Chesapeake Beach.
