

PATROL BUREAU

The Patrol Bureau is comprised of three Patrol Districts, the Twin Beaches Detachment, Support Services Unit, Fleet Services, Automated Enforcement Program, the K-9 Unit, and Civilian Staff. The Bureau is commanded by Captain Nathan Funchion, Lieutenant Eric Basham (District 1), Lieutenant Jason Dean (District 2), Lieutenant Thomas Tilly (District 3) and Lieutenant Joe Hollinger (Twin Beaches) with the assistance of Patrol Shift Commanders, F/Sgt. M. McCarroll, F/SGT. Naecker, F/Sgt. E. Carter, and Support Services Commander F/SGT. G. Shrawder.

During the 4th Quarter of 2024, Patrol Bureau personnel received several prestigious acknowledgments for their proactive policing efforts. Here are a few highlights:

Patrol Highlights

Calvert Deputies Recognized for DUI Efforts



As part of Designated Driver Month, five deputies and four Maryland State Police troopers were recognized by Calvert Alliance Against Substance Abuse, Inc. (CAASA) on December 3, 2024, for their exceptional efforts in keeping impaired drivers off the roads.

These officers were honored as top DUI enforcement officers for their commitment to enhancing public safety. This recognition highlights just a small part of the ongoing efforts by local law enforcement to ensure the streets of Calvert County remain safe for all residents.

Calvert Deputies Awarded Medal of Valor

On December 17, 2022, the lives of three Calvert County Sheriff's Office Deputies were forever altered. M/DFC James Flynt, DFC Anthony Aranda, and DFC Tyler Bowen were involved in an on-duty exchange of gunfire with a suspect who had fled from them. Tragically, M/DFC Flynt was shot and critically injured during the incident. This traumatic event will remain with all three deputies for the rest of their lives.

On November 19, 2024, at the conclusion of all court proceedings, these deputies were honored for their extraordinary bravery and awarded the Medal of Valor by the Calvert County Board of Commissioners in recognition of their heroic actions that night.

The Medal of Valor, the highest honor bestowed by the Sheriff's Office, is awarded to deputies who exhibit exceptional courage, outstanding decision-making, and swift action, often at great personal risk, in an effort to save lives or apprehend dangerous criminals.

PATROL BUREAU

The Patrol Bureau fills a wide array of functions within the Calvert County Sheriff's Office. As the Deputies which are seen "patrolling" day in and day out on the roadways and in the neighborhoods of Calvert County, personnel act as not only a deterring force for criminal activity but also as a safeguard when dangerous and criminal activity occurs. During the last quarter of 2024 the Calvert County Patrol Bureau handled 26327 Calls for Service, issued 1309 Traffic Citations and 5994 Traffic Warnings, made 56 DUI Arrests, and investigated 520 traffic Accidents.

His meticulous attention to detail ensures the highest standards in case management and law enforcement.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS BUREAU

In the fourth quarter of 2024, the Special Operations and Homeland Security Bureau executed 10 Special Operations Team (SOT) missions on behalf of the Criminal Investigations Bureau. Additionally, members of the Special Operation Team (SOT) continued to provide contracted security services for the BHE GT&S Cove Point LNG facility.

Over the past quarter, the team demonstrated a strong commitment to training, operations, and community engagement. Members enhanced their expertise through advanced courses, including the Direct-Action Resource Center (DARC) Counter-Terrorism Level 2 course and the Counter Narcotics and Terrorism Medical Support (CONTOMS) course in Washington, D.C. Several team members also attended the New Mexico Tech Suicide Bombers School, further developing their tactical proficiency. The team participated in various training initiatives, such as the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Coordinator Certification Training and the National Tactical Officers Association (NTOA) webinar on "Less Lethal Use During Protests." Additionally, they played a significant role in agency support by organizing patrol rifle and taser qualifications with a new scheduling application and assisting the Southern Maryland Criminal Justice Academy with recruit-level firearms training.



The team hosted a regional tactical workshop focusing on active shooter response and tactical trauma care, with participants from multiple agencies, including Prince George's County Police, DC Metropolitan Police, and U.S. Park Police. Joint training exercises were conducted with the Prince George's County Police Department and the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Drug Enforcement Unit (DEU), while scenario-based exercises such as ambush drills were implemented to support academy training. Members also provided Violent Critical Incident Training for organizations like Maryland Eye Associates and Calvert Internal Medicine Group, as well as a tabletop exercise for the Calvert Health Group to improve emergency preparedness.

The Special Operations Team (SOT) addressed community safety with initiatives like the Homeless Encampment Operation. They conducted range qualifications under the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act (LEOSA) and trained members in ballistic breaching to enhance active shooter response capabilities. Their expertise extended to hosting a patrol rifle class for academy graduates and completing Extreme Risk Protection Order training.

Community engagement remained a top priority. They participated in events such as the Barstow Elementary School Harvest Feast Trunk or Treat, Calvert Optimist Youth Appreciation Day, and the Pathfinders for Autism's First Responder Day, where the Bearcat vehicle was displayed. The team also engaged with students through tactical demonstrations for New Life Church homeschoolers and delivered criminal justice instruction at several local high schools, including Calvert, Patuxent, Northern, and Huntingtown.

To further connect with the community, the team participated in the Hate Bias Forum at the College of Southern Maryland and supported the Special Olympics athletes through multiple outreach events. They capped off their efforts with a visit to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Museum, reflecting their dedication to honoring the law enforcement profession while fostering personal and professional growth. This quarter's achievements highlight the team's unwavering focus on skill enhancement, operational excellence, and community impact.

NOTABLE CASE

Detectives Make Arrest in Cell Phone Thefts

On October 3, 2024, at approximately 2:23 p.m., detectives from the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Bureau responded to a reported theft in progress on Dorado Drive, Huntingtown, Maryland. The investigation was part of a broader effort involving several law enforcement agencies across Maryland, focusing on thefts of cell phones delivered to private residences.

Detectives conducted surveillance at multiple potential delivery sites. During the operation, they observed the suspect, identified as Jhonor Moises Mendez Pena (DOB: 05-29-1993), stealing a recently delivered package. Pena was promptly taken into custody without incident, and the stolen package was recovered at the scene.

The vehicle Pena was driving during the theft was seized as evidence and towed, pending a search warrant. Upon executing the search warrant, detectives recovered two additional cell phones believed to have been used by Pena.

Key Activities and Accomplishments

National Child Support Conference - Members of the Fugitive Warrant Unit attended the National Child Support Conference, enhancing knowledge and collaboration in child support enforcement strategies.

Major Warrant Initiative- Conducted a focused warrant initiative that led to significant progress in addressing outstanding warrants.

Child Support Amnesty Initiative- Organized and executed an amnesty initiative aimed at resolving child support warrants, promoting compliance while reducing enforcement burden.

OFFICE OF PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

2024 4th Quarter Report

During the Fourth Quarter of 2024, the Office of Professional Standards received the following:

Received Public Service Reports and Internal Complaints were investigated and/or are currently under investigation. Applicable Public Service case investigations that were concluded, were forwarded to the Administrative Charging Committee for review.

All Use of Force and Vehicle Pursuit Reports were reviewed and forwarded to the IAPRO Database.

During the quarter, OPS staff attended Police Accountability meetings, conducted mandated sex offender verifications, gathered proofs for assigned CALEA standards, and administered the agencies Random Drug Testing program.

TWIN BEACHES PATROL

The Twin Beach Patrol is commanded by Lt. Joe Hollinger with the assistance of Sgt. D. Naughton and Cpl. Gilmore along with eight deputies.



- Beach deputies responded to **929** citizen calls for service and **2692** self-initiated calls for the North Beach and Chesapeake Beach areas. Self-initiated calls include traffic stops, patrol checks, business checks, and follow-ups.
- In addition to working hard in the beach the Twin Beach Deputies enjoy interacting with the community and having fun during daily foot patrols on the local boardwalks, the newly built Twin Beaches Library, and the Wetlands Overlook Park and Nature Center.
- The Twin Beach deputies provide traffic enforcement daily to some of the larger neighborhoods to address and reduce speeding and reckless driving.
- Monthly reports are generated for the Chesapeake Beach and North Beach monthly Town Hall meetings. After the presentation of these reports questions or concerns may be addressed between the towns/residents and the Beach Deputies.
- The Twin Beach Deputies assisted in several special events held within the towns this quarter. These events include the Twin Beach Buccaneers Youth Football Homecoming, Gobblins' Halloween Parade at Beach Elementary School, the North Beach Volunteer Fire Department Open House and assisted with traffic direction at the North Beach Christmas Parade.

Calvert County has Lowest Crime Rate in Maryland

Calvert County State's Attorney Robert Harvey is pleased to report that in 2024, Calvert County experienced the lowest crime rate of any jurisdiction (23 counties and Baltimore City) in the State of Maryland. According to data published in the Maryland NIBRS Crime Dashboard, Calvert recorded 1,634 incidents per 100,000 population; the Statewide average was 3,771 incidents per 100,000.

Some of the credit for this success goes to the women and men of the *Calvert County State's Attorney's Office* who, along with the *Calvert County Sheriff's Office*, the *Maryland State Police*, and the *DNR Police*, work diligently to combat crime and hold people accountable for their actions. But, frankly, most of the credit belongs to the citizens of Calvert County. Calvert is blessed with strong families, strong neighborhoods, and strong civic and religious organizations. When neighbors look out for one another, report suspicious activities, and refuse to tolerate criminal behavior, the crime rate goes down.
