



PATROL BUREAU

The Patrol Bureau continues to serve as the backbone of the Calvert County Sheriff's Office, providing around-the-clock public safety services across the county. Charged with enforcing traffic laws, responding to emergencies, investigating crimes, and maintaining a visible presence in our communities, the Patrol Bureau remains dedicated to the safety and well-being of Calvert County residents and visitors.

Under the leadership of **Captain Nathan Funchion**, the bureau is comprised of:

- Three Patrol Districts
- Twin Beaches Detachment
- Support Services Unit
- Fleet Services
- Automated Enforcement Program
- K-9 Program
- Civilian Administrative Staff

Each division works in concert to uphold the Sheriff's Office mission of community safety and professional service. The Bureau is further supported by a team of experienced leaders, including:

Second Quarter 2025 Activity Overview

The Patrol Bureau continued proactive and high-volume operations throughout the second quarter, balancing emergency response, traffic enforcement, and public service.

Traffic enforcement remains a high priority, with focused efforts to deter impaired and reckless driving. Deputies investigated hundreds of motor vehicle accidents and

continue to work with state and local partners on initiatives to improve roadway safety across the county.

Throughout the second quarter of 2025, Deputy Campbell demonstrated outstanding productivity, professionalism, and a proactive approach to law enforcement. His contributions included 11 criminal arrests, 3 CDS arrests, 2 DUI arrests, 12 warrant/summons services, 53 written reports, and 128 traffic stops, resulting in 156 warnings and 24 citations. He also conducted 273 patrol and school checks and responded to 854 calls for service.

Deputy Campbell played a key role in closing a series of vehicle break-ins in the Prince Frederick and Huntingtown areas. Through diligent investigation and follow-up, he

identified and charged the responsible suspect, leading to the resolution of the cases and a noticeable reduction in similar incidents.

In addition to his enforcement efforts, Deputy Campbell consistently demonstrated teamwork by assisting other districts with manpower and responding promptly to calls for service. His commitment to professional growth is evident in his completion of the FAA Part 107 Remote Pilot Certificate, earned on his own time in preparation for future agency drone operations.

For his exemplary service and continued dedication to the mission of the Calvert County Sheriff's Office, we proudly recognized Deputy Ryan Campbell as the Deputy of the 2nd Quarter for 2025.


DFC Lanier Named Correctional Deputy of the 2nd Quarter

DFC M. Lanier is currently assigned to the Transportation Team, where he has proven to be an invaluable asset to the agency. DFC Lanier consistently takes on responsibilities that go above and beyond his regular duties. In the absence of his supervisor, he steps up to manage transport scheduling, which includes coordinating with outside agencies, obtaining writs, and securing the appropriate court documentation.

In addition to these responsibilities, DFC Lanier oversees vehicle inspections, tracks abandoned property, assists with scheduling maintenance and emissions checks for transport vehicles, and supports the management of the agency's radio inventory, inspections, and software updates.

Most recently, DFC Lanier was recognized for rendering critical assistance to a Maryland State Police Trooper involved in a serious motor vehicle accident. His quick thinking and calm response under pressure exemplify his commitment to public safety and teamwork.

For his dedication, initiative, and outstanding performance, DFC Lanier has been selected as the 'Deputy of the Second Quarter'.



SPECIAL OPERATIONS BUREAU

In the second quarter of 2025, the Special Operations and Homeland Security Bureau continued to advance its mission of enhancing operational readiness, promoting tactical excellence, and promoting community engagement. The team conducted 12 operations in direct support of the Drug Enforcement Unit (DEU) and the Criminal Investigations Bureau (CIB), providing vital tactical

assistance in high-risk law enforcement actions. As part of its commitment to advanced training and national best practices, several team members were sent to specialized schools across the country. Sergeant Livingston and Corporal DeFelice attended the Esoteric Hostage Rescue School in North Carolina, while First Sergeant Moran and Deputy First Class (DFC) Hendrickson traveled to Texas to complete a SWAT K9 integration program.

Additionally, DFC Anderson, DFC Gadwill, and F/Sgt. Moran successfully completed the Direct-Action Resource Center (DARC) Level One course, further strengthening the team's counter-terrorism capabilities. Corporal DeFelice also led a crisis response training session at Island Creek, sharing critical response techniques with fellow law enforcement personnel. In a significant professional development effort, Sgt. Livingston, Cpl. DeFelice, and F/Sgt. Moran completed Force Science's Advanced Instruction Method training, a nationally recognized course designed to enhance instructional quality and credibility in law enforcement education.

The Bureau also made strategic advancements in equipment modernization. The transition from the Glock 22 to the Glock 47, outfitted with red dot optics, officially began this quarter, reflecting a department-wide move toward improved accuracy and target acquisition. Several team members were also sent to Prince George's County to attend the Firearms Instructor Course, enhancing the agency's internal



training capacity. In conjunction with these efforts, the Bureau initiated the transition to the Taser 10 system, which now includes a state-of-the-art virtual reality (VR) headset to provide immersive, realistic training for instructors and deputies alike.

SOT members actively participated in a range of agency and regional events. Representatives attended the Maryland Tactical Officers Group (MTOG) meeting in Baltimore, fostering interagency collaboration and information sharing among law enforcement agencies. They also supported the Citizens Police Academy at Island Creek, reinforcing public trust and transparency.

Community engagement remained a priority throughout the quarter. The team hosted multiple public-facing events to showcase the capabilities of the Special Operations Team, helping to educate the public on the role and value of tactical operations in law enforcement. They also conducted a patrol rifle course to enhance the firearms proficiency of patrol deputies, ensuring a high level of preparedness across all levels of field operations. SOT also provided contracted security services for the BHE GT&S Cove Point LNG facility, demonstrating its vital role in both law enforcement operations and the protection of critical infrastructure.

Through focused training, critical mission support, community outreach, and a commitment to modernization, the Special Operations and Homeland Security Bureau continues to demonstrate professionalism, adaptability, and unwavering service to the agency and the community it serves.


Detectives Make Arrests in Lusby Shooting

On June 5, 2025, at approximately 11:38 a.m., deputies from the Calvert County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) Patrol Bureau responded to the 700 block of Spruce Drive in Lusby for the reported shooting. A citizen had contacted 911, advising that an individual had pulled up onto Spruce Drive and informed them they had just been shot while parked on Field Road.

Upon arrival, deputies located a 24-year-old female victim of Prince Frederick, seated in her vehicle, suffering from a gunshot wound to her lower back. Deputies immediately rendered aid until emergency medical personnel arrived. The victim was transported to a regional trauma center for non-life-threatening injuries.

A preliminary investigation revealed the victim had arranged to meet two males in the area of Evergreen Drive and Field Road. A white SUV, occupied by two males, arrived at the location. A black male exited the vehicle and approached the victim's car. Moments later, neighbors reported hearing gunshots and observed the male suspect re-enter the passenger seat of the SUV before it fled the scene at a high rate of speed.

Detectives from the CCSO Criminal Investigations Bureau (CIB) responded and assumed the investigation. Through swift investigative efforts, detectives located the suspect vehicle parked at a residence on Pine Trail in Lusby. An investigatory traffic stop was later conducted in the 12500 block of Catalina Road, where the driver, an 18-year-old male of Lusby, was taken into custody without incident.



Further investigation led detectives to a residence along H.G. Trueman Road in Lusby. As law enforcement approached, a male suspect fled on foot but was apprehended following a brief pursuit on the golf course behind the residence. The suspect, a 16-year-old male of Lusby, was taken into custody. A search of the residence recovered evidence supporting the investigation.

The **16-year-old male** has been charged as an adult with:

- Attempted First-Degree Murder
- Attempted Robbery with a Firearm
- First-Degree Assault
- Use of a Firearm During a Felony/Violent Crime
- Reckless Endangerment
- Possession of a Firearm Under the Age of 21 (x2)
- Removing/Obliterating a Serial Number on a Firearm

The **18-year male**, has been charged with:

- Attempted First-Degree Murder
- First-Degree Assault
- Armed Robbery with a Firearm
- Use of a Firearm During a Felony/Violent Crime
- Reckless Endangerment
- Possession of a Firearm Under the Age of 21

On June 6th through continued investigative the detectives identified and apprehended a third suspect involved in the shooting. The firearm used in the shooting was located at a girlfriend's house later in the day along with other significance evidence.

Detectives arrested a 15-year-old male of Lusby in connection with the case.

The **15-year-old male** has been charged as an adult with:

- Attempted First-Degree Murder
- Attempted Robbery with a Firearm
- First-Degree Assault
- Use of a Firearm During a Felony/Violent Crime
- Reckless Endangerment
- Possession of a Firearm Under the Age of 21

During the Second Quarter of 2025, the Office of Professional Standards received the following:

Received Public Service Reports and Internal Complaints were investigated and/or are currently under investigation. Applicable Public Service case investigations that were concluded, were forwarded to the Administrative Charging Committee for review.

All Use of Force and Vehicle Pursuit Reports were reviewed and forwarded to the IAPRO Database.

During the quarter, OPS staff conducted mandated sex offender verifications, gathered proofs for assigned CALEA standards, completed PIA requests, and administered the agencies Random Drug Testing program.

TWIN BEACHES PATROL

The Twin Beach Patrol is commanded by Lt. Joe Hollinger with the assistance of Sgt. J. Norton, Cpl. Gilmore, and eight deputies. With this staffing the Calvert County Sheriff's Office is able to provide around the clock patrols for the citizens of the Twin Beaches.

· Beach deputies responded **914** citizen calls for service and self-initiated **4,626** calls for the North Beach and Chesapeake Beach areas. Self-initiated calls include traffic stops, patrol checks, business checks and follow ups.

· The Twin beach deputies provide heavy traffic enforcements daily around Chesapeake Beach



and North Beach. This is in an effort to educate/remind the citizens of the traffic laws. In addition to making the roadways safer, this gives the Twin Beach Deputies opportunities to interact with the citizens.

- Monthly reports are generated for the Chesapeake Beach and North Beach monthly Town Hall meetings. After presentation of these reports and questions or concerns may be addressed between the towns/residents and the Twin Beach Deputies.

- During the 2nd Quarter of 2025, the Twin Beach Deputies have had the opportunity to work several special events held within the Twin Beaches. These events included the Dragon Boat Races, First Fridays in North Beach, Third Fridays in Chesapeake Beach, the Memorial Day Celebration at Veteran's Park, and the July 3rd Fireworks.
