

PATROL BUREAU

The Patrol Bureau continues to serve as the backbone of the Calvert County Sheriff's Office, providing around-the-clock public safety services throughout the county. Charged with enforcing traffic laws, responding to emergencies, investigating crimes, and maintaining a visible community presence, the Patrol Bureau remains steadfast in its mission to protect the residents and visitors of Calvert County.

Under the leadership of **Captain Nathan Funchion**, the Bureau is comprised of:

Third Quarter 2025 Activity Overview

Throughout the third quarter of 2025, Patrol Bureau deputies maintained a high level of operational activity, balancing emergency response, proactive patrols, and community engagement.

Traffic enforcement remains a key priority for the Bureau. Deputies continue to focus on deterring impaired and reckless driving while investigating hundreds of motor vehicle accidents and working closely with state and local partners to improve roadway safety across Calvert County.

Each quarter, the Sheriff's Office recognizes one deputy whose performance exemplifies the highest standards of professionalism and dedication. For the third quarter of 2025, **Deputy J. Angell** has been selected as Deputy of the Quarter for his exceptional initiative, productivity, and commitment to public safety.

During this period, Deputy Angell distinguished himself through relentless work ethic and consistently strong performance in the Twin Beaches community. Although still early in his career, he has demonstrated the focus and professionalism of a seasoned law enforcement officer.

Deputy Angell conducted **211** traffic stops, resulting in multiple enforcement actions, including **4** DUI arrests. In addition, he made multiple Controlled Dangerous Substance (CDS) arrests and was among the Bureau's most productive deputies in both traffic enforcement and proactive patrol activity.


Corrections Bureau Highlights

DFC Hart Named Correctional Deputy of the 3rd Quarter

Deputy First Class Cory Hart has proven to be one of the most dependable and effective members of Team 1, consistently assigned to posts with known issues due to his strong work ethic and command presence. This quarter, he was the first on scene for several major medical emergencies, including one where he helped save an inmate suffering from a seizure later linked to a brain growth. His attention to detail has led to the discovery and documentation of multiple contraband items, directly supporting the Detention Center's mission of maintaining safety for staff and inmates.

DFC Hart also completed an intensive "Interview and Interrogation" training course and has already applied these skills to obtain critical information during inmate interviews. While traveling to this training, he assisted at a serious vehicle accident, helping extinguish a car fire and rescue an unconscious driver.

DFC Hart's professionalism, initiative, and dedication reflect the highest standards of the Calvert County Detention Center, earning him recognition as the **Correctional Deputy of the 3rd Quarter of 2025**.



SPECIAL OPERATIONS BUREAU

In the third quarter of 2025, the Special Operations and Homeland Security Bureau continued to focus on operational readiness, interagency coordination, and public engagement. The team sustained its training tempo with multiple SOT Training Days held on July 22, August 19, and September 2 and 16. These sessions reinforced tactical proficiency and ensured that members remained aligned with current operational standards.

Patrol integration remained a key priority. Crisis Response Training for Patrol was conducted throughout July, with sessions on July 8–9, July 23, and July 28–31 at Island Creek. These iterations strengthened the ability of first-responding deputies to manage critical incidents alongside the tactical unit. Instructor development advanced during the quarter. On July 25, the team delivered a TASER 7 refresher for a new hire, followed by a full TASER instructor certification and recertification session for detention staff on August 1 at Island Creek. These courses enhanced the agency's capacity to employ less-lethal tools safely.

Firearms proficiency was also emphasized. On September 6, Special Deputy and Court Security officers completed their range qualifications at Sweetwater Road. The team then supported the Natural Resources Police's qualifications on September 15 and managed Detention Center range access, beginning September 22, to ensure all agency users met the annual standards.

A major highlight of the quarter was the five-day Advanced SWAT Course, conducted from September 22 to 26, in partnership with Asymmetric Solutions. This comprehensive training covered pistol and carbine manipulations, vehicle ambush defense, low-light and night vision



engagements, close-quarters battle fundamentals, greenside movement, and off-site target scenarios. Officers were challenged with dynamic role player-supported exercises that required mission planning, tactical decision-making, and execution under realistic stress conditions.

Several team members also attended advanced training at Blackwater alongside the St. Mary's County SWAT team, further enhancing interagency cooperation and specialized skill development. In addition to formal training courses, Cpl. DeFelice and Sgt. Livingston conducted several Active Shooter Incident trainings at local schools and fire departments. These sessions emphasized coordination, rapid response, and life-saving tactics in critical incident environments.

Operationally, the team remained heavily engaged, conducting 13 residential search warrants during the quarter. These operations included several barricade situations that required disciplined execution, negotiation, and tactical resolution. Critical infrastructure preparedness was exercised during a multi-day drill at the Calvert Cliffs Nuclear Power Plant from September 2 to 4. This engagement provided opportunities to refine security postures, access protocols, and communication workflows with site partners and interagency stakeholders.

Community outreach remained a strong emphasis. On August 5, the team supported National Night Out by providing demonstrations and fostering community trust through direct engagement. Later in the quarter, SOT showcased specialized equipment at Ward Farm Park's "Superhero Day," where families interacted with operators and viewed resources, including the Bearcat, drone unit, and command vehicle.

Through consistent training, instructor development, firearms qualifications, advanced SWAT coursework, specialized external training, operational deployments, infrastructure exercises, and public engagement, the Special Operations Team closed the third quarter with strengthened operational capacity and reinforced partnerships across the county.

DETECTIVE OF THE QUARTER

Det. Christopher Murphy Named Detective of the 3rd Quarter

Detective Christopher Murphy is the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Detective of the Third Quarter in recognition of his exceptional investigative work and professionalism in two major cases that resulted in the swift apprehension of dangerous offenders.

Case One: Child Sexual Assault Investigation

While serving as the on-call detective, Detective Murphy led the investigation into a sexual assault involving a five-year-old child. He coordinated with the Child Advocacy Center, CPS, and medical staff to ensure the victim's safety and proper procedures. Through interviews and a one-party consent call,



Detective Murphy obtained incriminating admissions from the suspect, which directly led to the arrest.

Case Two: Shooting at Neptune's Seafood Pub

Detective Murphy also directed the investigation into a shooting outside Neptune's Seafood Pub. His interviews and leads identified two suspects, and with the assistance of Anne Arundel County Police, both were apprehended during a search warrant that recovered multiple firearms, including a stolen handgun. Both offenders were charged with Attempted First-Degree Murder and other related charges.

Professionalism and Teamwork

These cases demonstrate Detective Murphy's skill, persistence, and leadership. It is also important to acknowledge the support of the entire Criminal Investigations Bureau and Drug Enforcement Unit, whose teamwork and collaboration were essential to the successful outcomes. Beyond these high-profile cases, Detective Murphy has consistently shown a strong work ethic, positive attitude, and willingness to assist his peers.

Conclusion

Detective Murphy's outstanding performance, combined with the collective efforts of CIB and DEU, highlight the strength of our agency. His professionalism and dedication make him highly deserving of recognition as the '**Detective of the Third Quarter of 2025**'.

SIGNIFICANT CASES

Detectives Make Arrest in Lusby Shooting

On September 16, 2025, at approximately 11:59 a.m., deputies from the Calvert County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to the 1100 block of Golden West Way in Lusby for the report of an abandoned 911 call. While en route, deputies were advised that the caller had reestablished contact and reported that an unknown suspect had driven past the residence and fired shots at them. The caller further reported returning fire after being shot at.

Upon arrival, deputies made contact with two individuals who stated they had been outside changing a tire when they observed a dark-colored four-door sedan with tinted windows approach. A firearm was displayed from the front passenger-side window, and the passenger fired two rounds in their direction. One of the individuals returned fire with one round. The vehicle fled southbound on Golden West Way toward Cordova Drive. The men advised that approximately five to seven minutes elapsed before their first attempt to call 911.

At approximately 11:52 a.m., Calvert Emergency Communications received a separate call from a nearby resident reporting a suspicious vehicle abandoned in their yard. Surveillance footage showed two individuals exiting the vehicle and fleeing on foot. The vehicle, a dark-colored Ford Focus with Virginia registration, matched the description provided by the victims.

Through witness statements and surveillance video, investigators identified the occupants of the vehicle and determined their involvement in the shooting. One suspect was located and taken into custody at a nearby residence. The second suspect later turned themselves in and was charged with multiple offenses, including Attempted First-Degree Murder, First- and Second-Degree Assault, Reckless Endangerment, Theft Less Than \$100, and Unauthorized Removal of a Motor Vehicle.



Arrest Made in Solomons Stabbing

On August 4, 2025, at approximately 10:08 a.m., deputies from the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Patrol Bureau responded to the Southern Branch Library, located at 13920 HG Trueman Road in Solomons, for the report of a stabbing.

Upon arrival, deputies located an adult female victim suffering from two stab wounds to her upper back. Additional deputies quickly canvassed the area and located the suspect across the street at the Solomons Fastop. The individual was taken into custody without further incident.

Detectives from the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Bureau responded and assumed the investigation. Preliminary findings revealed the victim, accompanied by her service dog, had entered the library moments before the assault. The suspect reportedly produced a knife from a pocket and struck the victim.

The attack appeared to be unprovoked and random, and there is no known relationship between the victim and the suspect. The victim was transported by Medevac to an area trauma center with non-life-threatening injuries.

The suspect was transported to the Calvert County Detention Center and charged with Attempted First-Degree Murder, Attempted Second-Degree Murder, First-Degree Assault, and Second-Degree Assault.

Arrest Made in Connection with Two Armed Robberies

On July 25, 2025, deputies from the Calvert County Sheriff's Office responded to the Verizon Wireless store in Dunkirk for a reported robbery. The suspect stole an Apple iPhone 16 Pro Max and left a threatening note on a napkin indicating he had a gun before fleeing the store on foot.

On July 27, 2025, the same suspect committed a second robbery at the Dash-In convenience store in Owings. During this incident, he again threatened the store clerk with a gun before fleeing the scene in a small white SUV with stolen cash.

The Calvert County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Bureau (CIB) quickly connected the two cases and initiated surveillance on the suspect. On July 30, 2025, investigators conducted a coordinated takedown operation in the Walmart parking lot in Bowie, taking the suspect into custody without incident.



The suspect is currently being held at the Calvert County Detention Center on multiple charges related to both robberies.


The Sheriff's Office commends the swift actions of the deputies and investigators whose collaborative efforts led to the apprehension of this suspect and the prevention of further criminal acts.

2025 3rd Quarter Report

Bureau Overview

The Administrative & Judicial Services Bureau oversees all administrative and judicial-related operations within the Sheriff's Office. Key responsibilities include:

- Security management at the Calvert County Courthouse
- Protection of Circuit Court judicial officers and courtrooms
- Service of civil documents, evictions, Sheriff's sales, and writs
- Supervision of the Southern Maryland Criminal Justice Academy student deputies
- Processing retirements, resignations, and terminations
- Oversight of the hiring process
- Execution of criminal processes, including arrest warrants, bench warrants, child support warrants, and criminal summonses

Civil Process Unit

The Civil Process Unit ensures the impartial service of civil documents such as subpoenas, summonses, evictions, and juvenile court papers. The unit also handles court-ordered property seizures and sales. Below are the statistical efforts for the 3rd Quarter.

During the Third Quarter of 2025, the Office of Professional Standards received the following:

Received Public Service Reports and Internal Complaints were investigated and/or are currently under investigation. Applicable Public Service case investigations that were concluded, were forwarded to the Administrative Charging Committee for review.

All Use of Force and Vehicle Pursuit Reports were reviewed and forwarded to the IAPRO Database.

During the quarter, OPS staff conducted mandated sex offender verifications, gathered proofs for assigned CALEA standards, completed PIA requests, and administered the agencies Random Drug Testing program.

TWIN BEACHES PATROL


The Twin Beach Patrol is commanded by Lt. Thomas Phelps with the assistance of Sgt. J. Norton, Cpl. Gilmore, and eight deputies. With this staffing the Calvert County Sheriff's Office is able to provide around the clock patrols for the citizens of the Twin Beaches.

- Beach deputies responded **978** citizen calls for service and self-initiated **4,286** calls for the North Beach and Chesapeake Beach areas. Self-initiated calls include traffic stops, patrol checks, business checks and follow ups.

- The Twin beach deputies provide heavy traffic enforcements daily around Chesapeake Beach and North Beach. This is in an effort to educate/remind the citizens of the traffic laws. In addition to making the roadways safer, this gives the Twin Beach Deputies opportunities to interact with the citizens.

- Monthly reports are generated for the Chesapeake Beach and North Beach monthly Town Hall meetings. After presentation of these reports and questions or concerns may be addressed between the towns/residents and the Twin Beach Deputies.

- During the 3rd Quarter of 2025, the Twin Beach Deputies have had the opportunity to work several special events held within the Twin Beaches. These events included the First Fridays in North Beach, Third Fridays in Chesapeake Beach, the July 3 Fireworks, and the Farmers Market.
