



PATROL BUREAU

The Patrol Bureau of the Calvert County Sheriff's Office continued to provide uninterrupted public safety services throughout the fourth quarter of 2025—a period traditionally marked by increased traffic volume, holiday travel, and seasonal weather challenges. Deputies remained focused on emergency response, traffic enforcement, crime prevention, and community engagement while maintaining a strong and visible presence throughout Calvert County.

Deputy of the 4th Quarter


DEPUTY HAYDEN JONES

Deputy Hayden Jones was selected as the Patrol Bureau's **Deputy of the Quarter for the 4th Quarter of 2025** in recognition of his consistent performance, professionalism, and positive impact on both his shift and the community.

Throughout the quarter, Deputy Jones demonstrated a proactive and dependable approach to patrol operations. His performance included **10 criminal arrests, 2 DUI arrests, 2 traffic arrests, 19 summonses and warrants, 134 traffic stops, and 184 patrol checks.** These results reflect his initiative, productivity, and commitment to active enforcement and public safety.

Beyond measurable performance, Deputy Jones consistently maintains a positive and motivating attitude. He leads by example, encourages proactive policing among his peers, and is always willing to assist when needed. His team-first mindset contributes to strong shift morale and overall operational effectiveness.

Deputy Jones also maintains a strong community-oriented approach to policing, routinely engaging with residents during patrol to build rapport and reinforce trust between the Sheriff's Office and the public. His professionalism, reliability, and willingness to volunteer for special assignments exemplify the qualities expected of a deputy sheriff.



Seasonal Enforcement & Public Safety Initiatives

Holiday Traffic Safety & DUI Enforcement

The fourth quarter includes major holiday travel periods such as Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's, which historically result in increased traffic congestion and impaired-driving risks. In coordination with statewide initiatives supported by the Maryland Department of Transportation and the Maryland State Police, Patrol Bureau deputies emphasized:

- DUI detection and enforcement
- Speed and aggressive driving deterrence
- Seatbelt and occupant safety compliance

In December, five Calvert County Sheriff's Office deputies were recognized by the Calvert Alliance Against Substance Abuse (CAASA) and the Calvert County Board of County Commissioners for outstanding DUI prevention efforts. Patrol personnel also supported the county-wide CAASA Designated Driver Campaign, conducted from December 1, 2025, through January 2, 2026, promoting responsible decision-making and impaired-driving prevention during the holiday season.

Winter Weather Response

As colder temperatures arrived, Patrol Bureau personnel responded to weather-related incidents including disabled vehicles, roadway hazards, and traffic crashes during periods of frost, freezing rain, and early winter precipitation. Deputies worked closely with county road crews, fire departments, and emergency medical services to maintain roadway safety and assist stranded motorists.



Community Engagement & Outreach

Throughout the quarter, Patrol and Support Services personnel participated in numerous community education and outreach events aimed at strengthening relationships and reinforcing public trust.

In November, the Sheriff's Office hosted the **8th Annual Day of Law** for students in the Calvert County homeschool community. Students toured agency headquarters and participated in hands-on demonstrations by the Motors Unit, Drone Team, K-9 Unit, and Special Operations Team, gaining insight into law enforcement careers and the judicial system.



Deputies also conducted outreach visits to local schools and childcare centers including **Inspired Minds in Huntingtown**, **Our Lady Star of the Sea School in Solomons**, **Little Lambs Preschool**, and **The Tot Spot in Sunderland**. These events emphasized community helper education, public safety awareness, and positive interactions between law enforcement and youth.

Twin Beaches Patrol deputies maintained an active presence at local community events, including the **Fall Festival hosted by Stallings-Williams American Legion Post 206 in Chesapeake Beach**, providing opportunities for informal engagement with residents and families.



4TH QUARTER ACTIVITY OVERVIEW

(October – December 2025)

Throughout the fourth quarter of 2025, Patrol Bureau deputies maintained a high level of operational activity while balancing emergency response, proactive patrols, and community engagement.

Key Statistics:

- **Total Calls for Service:** 30,725
- **Traffic Warnings Issued:** 7,063
- **Traffic Accidents Investigated:** 536
- **Traffic Citations Issued:** 1,229
- **DUI Arrests:** 76

Corrections Bureau Highlights

DFC Sunderland Named Correctional Deputy of the 4th Quarter

DFC Sunderland has demonstrated exceptional dedication, professionalism, and integrity as a member of the Transportation Unit and as a Correctional Deputy. He consistently upholds the highest standards of safety, security, and inmate accountability while maintaining a calm, reliable presence in demanding and unpredictable environments. His strong work ethic, positive attitude, and ability to work well with all he encounters combined with perfect attendance throughout his career make him highly deserving of this honor.

In recognition of these qualities, DFC Sunderland is named **2025 Correctional Deputy of the 4th Quarter**.



SPECIAL OPERATIONS BUREAU

During the fourth quarter of 2025, the Special Operations and Homeland Security Bureau remained focused on operational readiness, agency support, interagency coordination, and community engagement. The team maintained a consistent training tempo, conducting six SOT Training Days on October 14 and 28, November 25, and December 9, 23, and 30. These sessions reinforced tactical proficiency and ensured alignment with current operational standards.



Firearms training and qualification efforts were a significant focus this quarter. Between November 10 and November 21, the team supported Patrol Bureau and Command Staff annual firearms qualifications at the Sweetwater Road range. The team also assisted the Southern Maryland Criminal Justice Academy with recruit firearms training across multiple dates from October 30 through December 29. Additional support included conducting the PT test and range qualification for a newly hired Automated Enforcement Deputy and providing LEOSA make-up qualification dates in October and December.



This quarter marked the beginning of the agency's transition from the Glock G22 pistol to the Glock G47 pistol equipped with red-dot optics. An initial shipment was issued to red-dot-certified personnel and participants selected for a two-day red-dot transition course. Planning is underway to transition the remainder of the agency in 2026 once all pistols are received, inventoried, and training schedules finalized. Preparations are also ongoing for the rollout of the Taser 10 during the first quarter of 2026.

Advanced and specialty training continued throughout the quarter. Multiple team members attended courses at the Direct Action Resource Center, including Law Enforcement Counter-Terrorism Level II, Advanced Operational Breaching Techniques, and the Level I Kinetic Breacher Course. In October, Cpl. DeFelice completed recertification as a Master Taser Instructor in Columbus, Ohio. In December, Cpl. DeFelice and S/DFC Boerum attended a Simunition Instructor Course hosted by the Frederick Police Department. Additionally, SOT conducted several Active Shooter Incident response trainings at local schools and churches, reinforcing rapid response and life-saving tactics.

Operationally, the team executed four residential search warrants during the quarter, including one barricade incident that required coordinated negotiation and tactical resolution. Critical infrastructure preparedness was further exercised through a tabletop exercise, a security drill, and two force-on-force exercises conducted at the Calvert Cliffs Nuclear Power Plant in December, strengthening coordination with site security and partner agencies.

Community engagement remained a priority. SOT personnel delivered multiple instructional presentations for high school criminal justice programs across all four county high schools in November and December. The team also participated in several community outreach events, including touch-a-truck demonstrations, private school engagements, and Christmas parades in Twin Beaches and Prince Frederick.

Overall, the Special Operations Team closed the fourth quarter with sustained operational readiness, continued modernization of equipment and training, strong support to agency and academy functions, and reinforced partnerships with critical infrastructure stakeholders and the community.

DETECTIVE OF THE QUARTER

Det. Ryan Gough Named Detective of the 4th Quarter

Detective Gough is awarded **Detective of the Fourth Quarter** for outstanding performance and professionalism within the Calvert County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Bureau. During the fourth quarter, Detective Gough demonstrated exceptional investigative skill, initiative, and dedication to duty. He conducted a thorough investigation into an assault involving a handgun, leading to the execution of multiple search warrants and the arrest of a wanted suspect. He also led a complex and sensitive child sexual assault investigation, resulting in criminal charges related to the sexual assault of a 10-year-old child.

Throughout these and other investigations, Detective Gough consistently exhibited strong investigative instincts, attention to detail, and sound judgment, earning the trust and confidence of his supervisors. He willingly accepted complex cases and proved his ability to manage major investigations with professionalism and competence.



In 2025, Detective Gough ranked among the Bureau's most efficient detectives, achieving one of the highest case closure rates within the Criminal Investigations Bureau. His performance reflects great credit upon himself, the Bureau, and the Calvert County Sheriff's Office. For these reasons, Detective Gough is named 2025 Detective of the Fourth Quarter.

SIGNIFICANT CASES

SKIMMING DEVICE ARRESTS

In late September and October of 2025, deputies with the Calvert County Sheriff's Office located credit card skimming devices on ATMs inside three convenience stores in the northern portion of Calvert County. The initial device was discovered by an off-duty law enforcement officer and subsequently confirmed and removed by deputies. The skimming systems consisted of two components: an external overlay containing a camera and storage media used to capture PIN entries, and an internal card-reader component designed to record debit card information. Based on training and experience, deputies believed the devices were installed earlier that morning for later retrieval. Additional checks of nearby convenience stores resulted in the discovery of identical devices at two other locations; one internal component could not be retrieved after falling into an ATM. Employees reported no suspicious activity, and surveillance retention was limited. A department-wide notification was issued, and the investigation was forwarded to criminal investigators.



During the follow-up investigation, deputies reviewed surveillance footage and identified the same suspect entering each location and interacting solely with the ATMs within a short timeframe. Surveillance footage tracked the suspect's movements across multiple jurisdictions, revealing a consistent pattern of installing skimming devices at convenience stores. Electronic surveillance later confirmed the suspect actively engaging in similar activity, and the suspect was arrested by law enforcement in another jurisdiction while installing a skimming device on an ATM. Subsequent search warrants resulted in the recovery of numerous skimming devices, reprogrammed gift cards, manufacturing materials, and multiple forms of fraudulent identification. The suspect was charged with three counts of possession of a re-encoder/skimming device for the unauthorized use of payment device numbers, corresponding to each affected convenience store in Calvert County.

ASSAULT WITH A HANDGUN

In October of 2025, deputies responded to a residence in Huntingtown, Maryland, for an unknown problem and encountered a large house party involving approximately 20–25 juveniles and young adults. Deputies determined that the suspect, a 17-year-old juvenile male, assaulted multiple victims during the incident. The suspect struck a 17-year-old juvenile male in the face with a handgun, causing him to lose consciousness, assaulted a juvenile female by striking her in the head with the handgun while threatening to kill her, and forcibly took her cellphone. Additional witnesses reported the suspect and his girlfriend were involved in a physical assault against another juvenile female inside the residence. Multiple

witnesses corroborated that the suspect possessed a handgun, brandished it at several individuals, and fled the scene shortly thereafter. Victims sustained visible injuries consistent with the reported assaults, and video evidence captured the suspect brandishing a handgun during the incident.

During the subsequent investigation, deputies conducted numerous witness interviews, reviewed video evidence, and utilized investigative resources to identify and locate the suspect. Court-authorized phone tracking and search warrants were obtained for the suspect and his residence. During execution of the search warrant, deputies recovered firearms, ammunition, magazines, and clothing consistent with items worn during the incident. The suspect was taken into custody and charged with multiple offenses, including first-degree assault, second-degree assault, armed robbery with a firearm, theft, possession of regulated firearms while under the age of 21, and possession of a firearm without a serial number. The suspect was transported to the Calvert County Detention Center pending further judicial proceedings.

LARGE SCALE RETAIL THEFT

In November 2025, deputies responded to two retail locations in Calvert County for reported thefts involving a white male suspect who entered the stores using a green wheeled cart and stole large quantities of merchandise before exiting. Store surveillance footage confirmed the thefts, with a combined loss exceeding several thousand dollars. Deputies identified a silver/gray Toyota Sienna associated with the suspect through license plate reader data shortly after the thefts. Further investigation revealed irregular vehicle registration information and connections to locations known for organized retail theft activity. Deputies conducted surveillance and observed the suspect returning to a residence in Gwynn Oak, Baltimore County, where he was seen wearing the same clothing and carrying the same cart used during the thefts. The suspect confronted deputies during surveillance and fled the area on foot.



Through continued physical and electronic surveillance, deputies identified the suspect and documented a pattern of retail thefts across multiple jurisdictions in Maryland and Washington, D.C., involving similar methods. Search warrants were executed at the suspect's residence and vehicles, resulting in the recovery of large quantities of suspected stolen merchandise from numerous retail chains, fraudulent identification documents from multiple countries, forged documents, and the green wheeled cart used during the thefts. The suspect was arrested and charged with theft scheme, theft over \$1,500, possession of stolen property, identity fraud, and related offenses. The suspect was transported to the Calvert County Detention Center pending further judicial proceedings.

COMMERCIAL BURGLARY

In **December 2025**, a known citizen reported observing a male wearing an orange jumpsuit smash the front window of a business in Prince Frederick, Maryland, before fleeing on foot. Deputies responded and located a male matching the description approximately two blocks from the scene within minutes of the call; the suspect appeared out of breath and had mud on his shoes. During an area check, deputies located a silver pickup truck nearby with collectible sports cards in plain view, which was secured due to

its suspected connection to the incident. A crime scene technician responded and confirmed extensive damage to the business, including a shattered front window and multiple broken display cases, with numerous sports memorabilia items reported stolen. Surveillance video showed the suspect using a rock to gain entry, damaging display cases, and removing items in a black bag before fleeing. The estimated loss exceeded \$30,000. A records check revealed the suspect was also wanted in another Maryland jurisdiction for burglary. The suspect was arrested and transported to the Calvert County Detention Center.

FRAUD/ THEFT SCHEME

In April 2025, deputies were notified of a suspected fraud scheme at a licensed gaming establishment in Chesapeake Beach, Maryland, involving instant bingo pull-tab machines. Over several weeks, staff observed multiple suspects repeatedly playing specific machines and receiving unusually frequent high-value payouts. Surveillance footage showed the suspects inserting what appeared to be fictitious pull-tab tickets, resulting in immediate jackpot payouts. A review of machine audit logs and financial data revealed extreme anomalies, including net win percentages exceeding 200 percent, which is inconsistent with legitimate operation. Internal audits confirmed fraudulent payouts exceeding \$84,000, with total losses estimated to exceed \$250,000. Technical review identified unauthorized virtual machines and evidence of software manipulation and remote access exploitation. The investigation identified a primary suspect with administrative-level access to the gaming software and a second suspect who acted in concert with him.

In November 2025, deputies were alerted that the primary suspect had returned to the establishment and was again engaging with the machines. Deputies detained the suspect upon exit and recovered multiple fictitious gaming vouchers. A second suspect was later located and arrested at a nearby resort. Subsequent searches and audits confirmed additional fraudulent losses. During a recorded interview, the primary suspect admitted to printing fictitious vouchers, remotely manipulating gaming servers, and stealing more than \$250,000 in conjunction with accomplices. Both suspects were charged with theft scheme, theft over \$100,000, identity fraud, and obtaining property by deception and were incarcerated at the Calvert County Detention Center.



Bureau of Administrative and Judicial Services

2025 4th Quarter Report

Bureau Overview

The Administrative & Judicial Services Bureau oversees all administrative and judicial-related operations within the Sheriff's Office. Key responsibilities include:

- Security management at the Calvert County Courthouse
- Protection of Circuit Court judicial officers and courtrooms
- Service of civil documents, evictions, Sheriff's sales, and writs
- Supervision of the Southern Maryland Criminal Justice Academy student deputies
- Processing retirements, resignations, and terminations
- Oversight of the hiring process
- Execution of criminal processes, including arrest warrants, bench warrants, child support warrants, and criminal summonses

Civil Process Unit

The Civil Process Unit ensures the impartial service of civil documents such as subpoenas, summonses, evictions, and juvenile court papers. The unit also handles court-ordered property seizures and sales. Below are the statistical efforts for the 4th Quarter.

Civil Process



Fugitive Warrant Unit


The Fugitive Warrant Unit plays a vital role in protecting our community by locating and apprehending individuals with outstanding criminal warrants. This specialized team works tirelessly to track down fugitives wanted for offenses ranging from failure to appear in court to child support violations and serious criminal charges. 2025 4th Quarter Report

During the Fourth Quarter of 2025, the Office of Professional Standards received the following:

- Public Service Reports – 12
- Internal Complaints – 0
- Agency Vehicle Accidents - 16
- Vehicle Pursuits – 7
- Use of Force Reports – 21

Received Public Service Reports and Internal Complaints were investigated and/or are currently under investigation. Applicable Public Service case investigations that were concluded, were forwarded to the Administrative Charging Committee for review.

All Use of Force and Vehicle Pursuit Reports were reviewed and forwarded to the IAPRO Database.

During the quarter, OPS staff conducted mandated sex offender verifications, gathered proofs for assigned CALEA standards, completed PIA requests, and administered the agencies Random Drug Testing program.

TWIN BEACHES PATROL

The Twin Beach Patrol is commanded by Lt. Thomas Phelps with the assistance of Sgt. J. Norton, Cpl. Gilmore, and eight deputies. With this staffing the Calvert County Sheriff's Office is able to provide around the clock patrols for the citizens of the Twin Beaches.

Beach deputies responded **872** citizen calls for service and self-initiated **4,121** calls for the North Beach and Chesapeake Beach areas. Self-initiated calls include traffic stops, patrol checks, business checks and follow ups.



The Twin beach deputies provide heavy traffic enforcements daily around Chesapeake Beach and North Beach. This is in an effort to educate/remind the citizens of the traffic laws. In addition to making the roadways safer, this gives the Twin Beach Deputies opportunities to interact with the citizens.

Monthly reports are generated for the Chesapeake Beach and North Beach monthly Town Hall meetings. After presentation of these reports and questions or concerns may be addressed between the towns/residents and the Twin Beach Deputies.

During the 4th Quarter of 2025, the Twin Beach Deputies have had the opportunity to work several special events held within the Twin Beaches. These events included Light Up the Town, the North Beach Christmas Parade, the Showing of the Clydesdales, and the Chesapeake Beach Holiday Lights Tour. These events gave Deputies great opportunities to interact with citizens and continue building relationships between the CCSO and the residents of the Twin Beaches.
